2026 marks the 80th Anniversary of Boys & Girls Clubs of Snohomish County. What started as a Boys Club in North Everett has grown to 29 clubs throughout Snohomish County and beyond. We have a long and proud history of serving the communities, families, and youth that need us the most. Through the last 80 years, our commitment has never wavered.

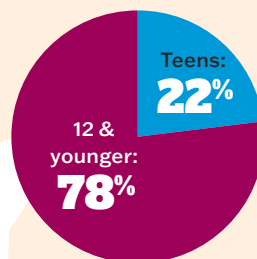
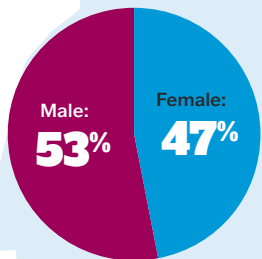

Our Team

The dedicated staff and volunteers of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Snohomish County work relentlessly to provide a high-quality Club experience for Club members. Our youth development professionals provide a safe, inclusive space for the 27,205 kids they inspire each day. Many of our staff members were once Club kids and have chosen to give back to the place that helped shape them. With the help of volunteers, Clubs can provide mentors, coaches, enriching activities, and positive, supportive adults daily.

Evens Henry Mentor of the Year Award

During our 2025 Youth of the Year event we recognized and awarded the first ever Mentor of the Year Award. This award is named for our first recipient, Evens Henry, who has been at our Alderwood Club for over 28 years. In that time, he has made a positive impact on hundreds of youth.

On February 5th at our 2026 Youth of the Year, the second Evens Henry Mentor of the Year award was given to Lisa Saunders of our Snohomish Club. Lisa has been a staff member for over 15 years and goes the extra mile for families and Club kids. She has helped countless teens apply to college, and provided mentoring as they start their first job working at the Club.

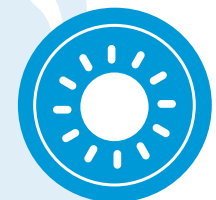

What is Youth of the Year?

Youth of the Year is the Boys & Girls Club's premier youth recognition program. In the 21st-century world and workplace, leadership skills such as communication, goal-setting and teamwork are essential for everyone—especially young people preparing to meet the challenges of

adolescence and adulthood. With a grassroots beginning in 1947, Youth of the Year has evolved into a comprehensive leadership development program.

One teen from each Club participates in the annual process, which involves essay writing and public speaking. They are interviewed by a panel of judges and deliver their speech focused on their Club experience and their plans for the future. Each applicant receives a scholarship and one youth is selected to represent the Boys & Girls Clubs of Snohomish County at the state level.

Cascade Club



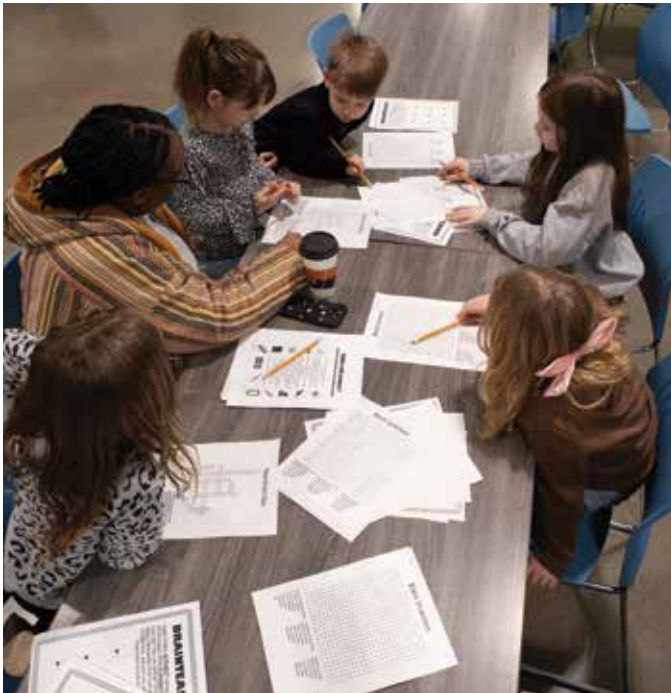
